ORGANIZING BUILDS SUPPORT FOR CLIMATE ACTION

The Climate Action Campaign is a coalition of organizations ranging from Sierra Club to Environment America to Environmental Defense Fund and the Student PIRGs. This year, the Student PIRGs hired Green Corps to expand the coalition's youth organizing efforts to build momentum for recent progress in federal clean energy policy.

Successful implementation of new federal policies, including the Inflation Reduction Act and Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, could reduce our country's global warming emissions by up to 40% below our 2005 emissions by 2030, a major milestone in tackling climate change. Under these policies, Americans can take advantage of related tax incentives and discounts to invest in clean energy, electrify their homes and improve energy efficiency. As a result, they can save money and save the environment at the same time.

Texas students continue to organize for climate action with TexPIRG in 2024.

But, most Americans are unaware of the credits and discounts they're eligible for and there have been proposals in Congress to cut funding for these clean energy programs. That's why Green Corps has been working to educate the public about these policies and build the political support needed to protect these programs.

For example, Belle Sherwood started her Green Corps year in Texas, where she quickly recruited local student leaders at the University of Texas at Austin to mobilize the Austin community on this issue and call upon members of Congress to support the full funding of federal clean energy programs. Belle's team helped hundreds of young people register to vote, delivered more than 500 petitions and photo petitions to Rep. Lloyd Doggett's office in Washington, D.C., and sent students to attend the first-ever EPA National Environmental Youth Advisory Council meeting.

Belle also organized students in Michigan and Nevada, first through digital outreach and then doing more intensive organizing work in person at four universities. She built visibility for this campaign through digital outreach and then flew to do more intensive work with volunteers at four additional universities. At the end of a week in Nevada, at a rally headlined by Vice President Kamala Harris, Belle was able to tell the vice president how deeply the young people volunteering on our campaign care about climate change.

It remains to be seen how successful the Inflation Reduction Act and other federal policies will be in promoting clean energy and curbing climate-changing emissions. But with organizing help from Green Corps, young volunteers across multiple states are educating the public and making the call for climate action heard in Washington.

pushes automotive companies to transition to zero-emission vehicles and advocates for strong clean car standards. Recently, they organized press conferences, rallies and leafleting outside of five North American auto shows calling on Toyota to stop greenwashing and commit to a fossil fuelfree future. They also coordinate Public Citizen's media work and coalition engagement on this issue.

Prior to that role, East worked as Public Citizen's climate financial policy campaigner, calling on financial institutions and regulators to end financing of fossil fuel projects and collaborated with the Stop the Money Pipeline Coalition. East honed their advocacy and grassroots organizing skills as an assistant organizing director and recruitment director with Green Corps before joining Public Citizen.
